Area sales tax revenues up for 2017 – except in Reno

Azle, Springtown see increases from 2016 numbers

With only one exception, area taxing authorities ended 2017 having generated more revenue from sales tax than in 2016.

Reno – the exception – dipped below 2016 levels by 7.5 percent. Its revenue from sales tax at the end of 2017 is \$169,011, compared with 2016 revenue of \$182,333.

However, Reno's December payment of \$13,910 reflected an 11.76 percent increase from its December 2016 payment of \$12,446.

Azle received \$185,357 for December, up 9.33 percent from \$169,527 in December 2016. That jump brought the city's total sales tax revenue for 2017 to \$2,441,473 – just 0.24 percent above 2016's total of \$2,435,590.

Azle's Crime Control and Prevention District (CCPD) received December revenue of \$34,905, a 6.36 percent increase from \$32,817 in December 2016. The CCPD's 2017 revenue totals \$462,458 for 2017, up 2.42 percent from \$451,520 in 2016.

Azle's Municipal Development District (MDD) received \$36,444 for December, 2.44 percent more than its December 2016 revenue of \$34,131. The MDD generated a total of \$483,293 in sales tax revenue in 2017, a 2.44 percent increase from 2016 revenue of \$471,754.

Springtown's December sales tax revenue of \$118,583 is 22.21 percent more than its December 2016 revenue of \$97,030. At the end of 2017, the city has generated \$1,381,774, 17.41 percent more than its 2016 revenue of \$1,176,812.

Although its December sales tax revenue of \$16,392 is down 8.23 percent from \$17,862 in December 2016, Lakeside's total sales tax revenue for 2017 of \$215,443 is up 4.86 percent from \$205,444 in 2016.

Parker County's December revenue from sales tax of \$651,080 represents a 3.73 percent increase from December 2016 revenue of \$627,611. For 2017, total sales tax revenue is \$8,172,778. Compared with 2016 revenue of \$7,575,317, that's an increase of 7.88 percent.

Sanctuary received \$2,141 in sales tax revenue for December, a 40.85 percent increase from its December 2016 payment of \$1,520. With \$24,945 on the books for 2017, the city is up 12.35 percent from 2016 totals of \$22,201. Pelican Bay showed the largest increase of all area taxing authorities in 2017. Its December sales tax revenue of \$5,926 is a whopping 238.61 percent more than its December 2016 revenue of \$1,750. That brings the Bay's total sales tax revenue for 2017 to \$33,105 – a 75.33 percent increase from 2016 total sales tax revenue of \$18,881.

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced Dec. 6 he will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$695.2 million in local sales tax allocations for December, 10.8 percent more than in December 2016. These allocations are based on sales made in October by businesses that report tax monthly.
